
Dear Mr. Banks:



CLASS CARS/JAMES K. GLASSMAN

AVANTI-GARDE

With its sleek good looks and powerful engine, this charmer leaves other luxury cars in the dust.

One of the first Class Cars I ever reviewed was a rare species called the Avanti II. I said it was a car that "beautifies America." That was four year ago.

But it still does. The story of the Avanti is a tale of perseverance and fairth. The car was originally designed in 1962 for Studebaker by the French genus Raymond Loewy, who in the vears tollowing World War II made the company the most stylistically daring in America. With its broad curves and its whimsical front end that looked like a friendly hammerhead shark, the Avanti was an instant sensation. Unfortunately, it couldn't save Studebaker, which went out of business the following year.

But an auto dealer in South Bend, Indiana, named Nathan Altman bought the rights to produce the car and hired 75 former Studebaker employees to work on it. From 1965 until 1980, Altman and his brother, Arnold, supervised the production of about 200 custom-made cars a year. Nearly 1,000 manhours went into each Avanti (which the Altmans dubbed "11"), and as late as 1980, they were selling for less than \$20,000, a remarkably low price.

The Avanti II was no plastic replica. It was almost precisely the same as the original, with a few design concessions to federal safety standards. The Altmans also replaced the powerful Studebaker 289-cubic-inch V-8 engine with Chevrolet 350. And throughout the 70s, despite the gas crisis and the move roward utility, the Avanti II remained a strong seller. The company never had an unprofitable year.

Three years ago, the Altman family sold the company to a group headed by a Washington businessman and Avanti fan named Stephen Blake. He hired more workers at the South Bend plant, and the company now produces 350 Avantis--the "II" is gone-a year. In a shrewd marketing move, Blake also has made the car more luxunous and established it in a clear market niche. It's a machine for people who find Jaguars, Mercedes, and BMWs too tame. It's made for those who dored on the



A compuny headed in Washington businessman Stephen Blake now produces 350 Awards a year. They all draw stares. great American cars of the early- and mid-'60s, the last golden age of motoring in this country, an age that produced the Pontiac GTO, the Ford Mustang, and the Impala convertible.

The base price of the Avanti has been raised to \$31,860. (Air conditioning, cruise control, central locking, and AM-FM stereo cassette are standard.) And with such extras as leather interior, electric sunroof, and touring package (Goodyear Eagle GT rires, etc.), the total comes to more than \$36,000. With its gorgeous control panel (round dials, wood inlays, and aircraft-style switches over the windshield), the Avanti easily measures up to the Mercedes 380 SL. Mercedes owners, bored with the placid comfort of their cars, are buying the new Avantis, and at least one, my friend Vic Gold, the Washington writer, is very, very pleased.

So was I. Blake & Company has installed a new engine, a GM 5.0-liter HO V-8, the same as on the Camaro Z-23. It roars delightfully and powers the Avanti from 0 to 60 miles per hour in 8.4 seconds. That's quicker than a Marda RX-7, Porsche 944, or Toyota Supra. The Avanti can leave a Thunderbird Turbo Coupe or a Mercedes 350 SL far in the dust. I was also pleasantly surprised by the four-speed automatic transmission, also from GM. A five-speed manual is due soon.

As well as the Avanti performs, you should buy it not for speed and handling, but for its unusual looks, which you either love or hate. I love them. Loewy, who had a penchant for aerodynamics and innovation, designed sleek locomotives and the Exxon, Shell, and Lucky Strike logos. His car is as fresh today as it was in the early '60s. And it draws stares, more long looks than any car I've driven in my years of doing this column. I pulled up to a luxury hotel one night and immediately drew an appreciative crowd.


You don't need outlandish color combinations to attract attention in an Avanti. In its originality and brisk good looks, it's one of the best cars on the road today.

I hope everyone had a Merry Christmas and kept their New Years celebrating to a safe and manageable level.


I would like to thank all of you who have decided to continue with us and especially to thank those of you who have worked so hard to make our Chapter the kind of organization of which we all can be so proud.





The children arrived about 1:15 and were given name tags (they knew who they were, but we didn't). After a round of musical chairs, we had lunch which consisted of ham, turkey, meatballs, beans, slaw, jello. sweet potatoes, devilled egs, and lemonade followed by lots of homemade cookies. After another game, the children sams some Christmas carols and other songs for us with many, especially one group of girls, showing considerable talent.

Then the big moment arrived. Santa put in an appearance (bearing a tremendous likeness to Gedney Parton) and the excitement reached its peak. The children waited anxiously for Santa to call their names and they went up one by one to receive their gift. With over 30 children present, it was certainly noisy, but it was a happy noise to be sure.

It was a joy to watch their eyes light up as they came forward to thank Santa and receive their gifts. Some seemed as if to be wondering why Santa had two beards.

After the "grand opening" of the packages, the children played and shared their booty. A short while later, the stockings were passed out and then the children gathered up and sang for us again. Tears swelled up in a few eyes as we watched them stand so solemnly and sing. It was a very heart warming afternoon.

There were many personal contributions of clothing and food for the home along with the food which was prepared for the party. As usual, The Southland Corporation (in the person of Larry Good) was more than generous providing turkey, bread, rolls, relienes, chips, beverages, and stocking stuffers. Publix reseanded to our request for help with 2 gift certificate which was used to sure issended items for the luncheon. Thanks to Jim Belcher of the Tuscawilla store for his help and kindness in semitting the deli staff to slice the turkey roasts for us (thanks Val). Mrs Rose Cass from Michigan, who was visiting my sister, made all of the stockings for the children.

It is truly gratifying when oecols, who are not involved with our Chapter, pitch in and help. I extend my sincere thanks to all of you who contributed to making this event a success.

Giving is actually a somewhat selfish act when you really think about it. As the "givers" we received a great feeling of satisfaction for helping someone less fortunate. We could have had our earty without the children from the Home and we would have had a fine time. Having the children with us added that intanginie entre that made it an event in the true spirit of Christmas.

If your 1962-66 Lark needs a new horn relay because the old one is bad, or you just want a new one to complete a show type engine compartment, use Ford #B8C-B853-A. It is an exact replacement which may also fit earlier Larks.

Many other small farm tractors also use them. However, it is not a battery that a parts store would sell every day (or week or month), so it may have to be ordered for you.

While on the subject of batteries, you all know how the terminals grow flowers when let be. If you want to prevent this from happening there are chemical washers available to put under each cable when you put it on to keep this from happening, and they work pretty well. Use

Plymouth, and Dodge as they have the $\frac{1}{2}$ " x 20 lugs and are a 3/4" hex on outside. They also are left and right thread on the ones in the late 50's and early 60's. If you have a Stude with holes in the wheel that are worn a little, you can use a Ford lug nut. BUT it is a 13/16" hex on the outside. For those with a left hand stud and worn holes in the whee' on that side, use one from about a 1959 Pontiac with a 13/hex. But if you use the 13/16" hex lug nuts don't forget get a lug wrench to fit them.





On December 31st I visited the Classic Chevy Club International (CCCI) headquarters where I met the Danny Howell, the Vice President. I introduced myself explained that I wasn't a member, but was

I introduced myself explained that I wash the member, but was looking for a door for my brother in law's 55 Chevy. I told him of our Studebaker Chapter and he was very interested in how many members we had and how things were going for us.

He, along with his friend from college Doug Moorhead, started the CCCI in 1974 after graduation. It started out as their hobby and they have they seen it develop into their full time jobs.

Through the years they have had almost 55,000 members with a current active membership worldwide of over 25,000. They publish a monthly 35 page magazine called Classic Chevy World in full color and store about 1400 parts in their new 12,000 square foot warehouse.

He introduced me to several of the nearly 40 employees including Doug Moorehead (President), and him Sharp who does the typesetting for the magazine and then offered to show me around.

We toured the computer room, the shipping room, the order room, and his office before going into the warehouse. He showed me some of the parts on hand and explained that General Motors reproduces many of the parts for him, and also some of the original suppliers to Chevrolet are now supplying parts for CCCC.

CCCI has made arrangements with local shops to make parts and also has manufacturers across the country supplying other items. I must have looked like the kid in the chocolate factory as my eyes were wide open and I kept hearing myselr repeating such brilliant rhetored as "wow" and "fantastic". The chought of inlimited parts availability was almost too much.

Dan then showed me a wall map measuring about 5 feet square which had little markers indicating the number of members in various countries around the world.

I understand now why there are so many nice 55-57 Chevys running around Orlando. With an outfit like COOL so close by it is easy to see why Dan says they are the easiest cars in the world to restore. We have much more of a challenge with our Studebakers. I have been corresponding with a guy in New Brunswick, Canada who has been trying to find upholstery for his 56 Solden Hawk since 1975.

I guess a good comparison of CCCI would be something like compliing SDC with Special Interest Autos of St. Louis on Newman & Alonge. Of course dealing with only three years or care that were some or the best sellers in U. 3. history, they can specialize much existen than the Studebaker vendors trying to cover over suby years of care which never exceeded 5% of the market.

I spent about an hour there and hated to leave, but Dan did have to get back to work. He did offer to come and talk to us at one of our meetings if we are interested and perhaps, if there was enough interest among our members, he might consider giving all of us a bour.

ABOUT JUDGING

by Chief Judge for the State Meet Fred D. Wilcoxson

Since becoming responsible for judging at the State Meet, I've discovered that there are numerous types of judging ranging from "People's Choice" to 1000 point scoring, each with many variations. Very quickly I found that both "People's Choice" and the 400 point system, used at the International, were very UNPOPULAR. In evaluating the various alternatives for presentation to the Club, I weighed two factors very heavily. The first was that everyone should have FUN, so the judging should not be too strenuous. The second, that for those people who are going to the International in July, the judging should be a good evaluation of the condition of their vehicles. Ι decided that a 200 point system should meet that criteria. The Club unanimously endorsed that proposal. The variation I selected will use the same form that was used in Ft. Lauderdale a few years ago. You will find a copy of that judging form in this issue.

I personally will not be doing any judging. I will solicit two judges from each of the Florida Chapters with alternates provided by the Orlando Area Chapter. These eight judges will be divided into two, four-man teams. Each team will judge half of the classes. Hopefully, this will make judging move faster and not be so hard on the I will coordinate judging, judges. tabulate results and make the award presentations. Although I prefer to call myself the Judging Coordinator rather than the Chief Judge, I will be responsible for settling disputes and making final decisions. I will handle that chore by consulting my judging teams and evaluating the written documentation. Burdon of proof will be the responsibility of the entrant.

Judges will be served a FULL breakfast, buffet style, during which time they will be briefed.

Following the International, a decision was made to help the sponsoring chapters by purchasing from them the trophies that were not awarded. These trophies will be awarded at this State Meet. As many of you know, these are super nice (and expensive) trophies. The number and places of trophies to a certain extent dictated the number of classes for judging.

The following is a break-down of classes for this State Meet:

We don't care what stage of restoration or deterioration they are in There will be no criteria for the "People's Choice" (favorite body style, ugliest, most unique, etc.), this will be up to the voter.

We are prepared for as many registrants that show up. We will have a nice dash plaque, meet handbook, goody bag, give-aways all day long, a super banquet, door prizes, great trophies and lots of fun. I hope to see every single one of you on March 22nd & 23rd!

What Studebaker achieved in 1952, Oldsmobile will not attain until 1997, and it will be six years after that before Ford. Buick and Cadillac reach the same milestone. For Chevrolet it will come in 2012, Dodge in 2014, Lincoln in 2021, Chrysler in 2024, Pontiac in 2026, Plymouth in 2028 and Mercury will have to wait until the year 2039. By now most of you have guessed the milestone to which this writer is referring. Yes, these are centennial anniversary dates and as of now Studebaker is the only American vehicle manufacturer, surviving or deceased, that reached its 100th anniversary. Granted, one-half of these 100 years were occupied in producing only non-motorized vehicles, but Studebaker's early carriages, sleighs and other horsedrawn vehicles were as essential to 19th century transportation as the automobile is today.


Discovery Hall Museum, home of the Studebaker Automobile Collection, hosted an author's signing party to announce publication of Studebaker: Less Than They Promized.

book is a companion to Beatty's film, which won a Peabody Award and an Emmy.


Studebaker: Less Than They Promised explores the relationship between the Studebaker Corp. and the city of South Bend. Generations of family members were employed by Studebaker, so its decision to cease car production was an economic as well as psychological shock to the community. Beatty's documentary viewed this special relationship through the Bokons, a family with 'two generations working for Studebaker.

The book's title comes from Studebaker's pledge to its customer: "Always give more than you promise."

Wheel collectors have established the February, 1926 issue to be the first. There were at least 117 issues published with the pre 1933 issues being the most informative. Publication was halted between April 1933 and May 1936 when financial difficulties forced Studebaker into receivership.


See if you recognize these attitude models in people you know, or maybe in yourself from time to time. You'll find that your attitude has a significant effect on your ability to drive safely.





BROKEN FLEX PLATES

--EVERETT GENTRY

(editor of the Central Oklahoma Chapter Newsletter) We often hear of persons who have acquired Studebakers equipped with Stude V-8 engines that were supposedly overhauled. The thing that scared me about a so-called overhauled engine is that some shade tree mechanic may have installed a bell housing (torque converter housing) from another engine without checking its alignment. Bell housings installed at the factory were calibrated and mated to the back of each engine before two dowel pins were placed in the outer edge of the housing to maintain proper alignment. If a different bell housing is added to a Stude engine or new short block without an alignment check, the owner will probably be plagued with broken flex plates. A flex plate is simply a flat round 7½-in. diameter steel disc that bolts to the


rear crankshaft flange. Six bolts in the outer edge of the flex plate are used to fasten it to the torque converter. Whenever a bell housing is attached on an engine either too high, too low, or off to one side it means the torque converter and transmission will not be rotating on precisely the same axis as the crankshaft. This places the flex plate in a bind and causes it to crack, make odd noises, or fail.

Recently, three of our chapter members discovered broken flex plates caused by misaligned bell housings on their Hawk engines, and each of them recalibrated the housing alignment. This writer assisted Greg Scherpereel in using a dial indicator to check the bore on his housing, although, our test equipment was inadequate for checking the face runout (where the transmission butts against the bell housing). The following is a step-by-step procedure we used:

- 1. Remove engine from the car and transmission from the engine.
- 2. Remove bell housing in order to unbolt the torque converter from flex plate.
- <u>Checking alignment-Install</u> the housing on the dowel pins and tighten the bolts.
 Install the clutch aligning gauge (J-2045) in the rear end of the grankshaft. Since we did not have a J-2045 gauge, we used a dial test indicator mounted on a shaft that attaches to rear crankshaft flange or the flex plate and is held in place by two powerful magnets.
- 5. Slowly revolve the crankshaft using a 13-in. socket wrench on the front crankshaft bolt. Note: The bore on two of the bell housings previously mentioned were found out of alignment approximately .050-in... Normal tolerance is .004----
- Remove the bell housing and drive out the original dowel pins.
- 7. Assemble the housing on the engine. Tighten the capscrews only enough to hold the housing in place against the engine block.
- 3. Again check the bore runout, and if it is not within limits, use a lead harmer or a block of wood and a hammer-to shift the housing until the bore runout is within limits (.004-in.).
- 9. Tighten the capscrews and recheck the runout.

LET'S GET OUR HANDS DIRTYI

- 10. To maintain the alignment, use a 23/64-in. drill and enlarge the old dowel pin holes.
- 11. To make new dowel pins use two 3/8-in. bolts (not hard ones) with unthreaded shanks of about 11-in. Use a hack saw to saw off the bolt heads.
- 12. The threaded porion of the bolts can be placed in a drill press check and rotated. Turn on the drill press while holding a file against thebolt shank, thus reducing the diameter of the new pins so they will fit tightly in the enlarged dowel holes.
- 13. When the proper diameter of the new dowel pins has been attained, they can be sawed off the appropriate length and driven into the holes.



Before installing the torque converter it is usually wise to install a new pilot bearing in the blind hole of the crankshaft. This 3/4-in, inside diameter bronze bushing can be purchased for 92¢ at local parts stores. Ask for Dorman pilot bushing #690-005 Bell housing alignment is very critical on six cylinder Stude engines with automatic transmissions. Also, standard transmissions will jump out of gear when clutch housings are misaligned.

The 11 Commandments of Car Care

October was National Car Care Month (did you notice?) and the Automobile Club of Southern California sent out this list of 11 commandments for a healthier automobile:

I. Check oil level every other time you buy gasoline. If it's low, add oil. Consult your owner's manual for recommended oilchange frequency.

2. Check radiator fluid level weekly but never when the engine is hot. Add fluid if necessary. Replace antifreeze/coolant solution at least once a year.

3. Check tire pressure weekly. Keep inflated to recommended pressure. Inspect tires monthly for cuts and excessive tread wear. Replace if worn.

4. Check brake fluid monthly. Fill if low. Test brake pedal to be sure it's firm and high.

5. Inspect drive belts, hoses, and clamps monthly. Tighten/replace as needed.

6. Check the battery level and cables weekly. Old-model batteries require water; newer ones show condition by a color indicator. Make sure cables are free of corrosion and are firmly attached.

7. Check air filter monthly. Replace if dirty. 8. Check transmission fluid level monthly.

9. Check windshield wiper solvent and

blades monthly. Refill/replace if necessary. 10. Test lights monthly. Turn on ignition

and check front, rear, brake, park, low and high beams, and turn indicators. Replace burned-out bulbs and fuses.

11. Adjust your seatbelt to fit you snugly before every trip. A belted driver in a wellmaintained car is the fundamental commandment for a lifetime of safe driving.

If you have a chamois that you could drive nails with, stir it in a bucket of warm water and add a shot of olive oil.

Those pick-up truck drivers with the spare tire underneath the bed might benefit by putting that spare in a large plastic trash bag and tying it shut, forever sealing out dirt, dust and grime. This will ease clean up at show time. While you have those trash bags out, throw an extra one or two in your vehicle because they can be used as an emergency rain coat or shop apron. Just cut or tear holes for head and arms and slip it over your good clothes. Throw one on the ground and use it for a drop cloth when working under the car or changing a tire, and then you can leave the dirt on the ground where it belongs, not in your car.

> If you have Studebaker wheels on your car with lug nut holes that are getting quite large, then use a Ford Lug nut and it will solve your problem. The only drawback is that they are a 13/16" hex instead of a 3/4" hex so remember to change to a larger lug wrench.

> If you need wheels for your Studebaker and would like a wheel that is a little wider than the Studebaker 4½", then look for the Ford or Chrysler products of the late 60's and early 70's. The Studebaker wheel has a 4½" bolt circle and so does Ford and Chrysler. So find the wheel you want and lug nut to fit the same wheel. Use Ford lug nuts on For wheels and Chrysler lug nuts on Chrysler wheels. Both o. these companys and Studebaker use a ½" X 20 thread lug stud.

Tip from a radiator man. With widespread use of anti-Freeze to raise the boiling point temperature, a 14 lb. cap causes unnecessary pressure, causing failure of side tubes prematurely. Use a 7 lb. cap.



LET'S GET OUR HANDS DIRTY!

John C. Erb

A number of years before I became an SDC member were spent evaluating and reengineering the Paxton supercharger. When my efforts resulted in three or four times the stock pressure output I ran into a few tricky problems. The solution to one of these problems can be of benefit to almost all performance Studebakers; gas starvation. This condition is usually alleviated with multi-electric fuel pumps, large gas lines, etc. With the hope of seeingthe problem first hand I ran a clear fuel line and filter to the carburetor and removed the hood from my car. I could now observe the fuel flow to the engine while driving. Fuel sloshed through the filter at a great rate until I got over 5000 rpm then it stopped. The engine ran on okay on carburetor bowl fuel and then shut down. As soon as the rpm dipped below 5000 the flow started again. With an electric fuel pump mounted on the tank I got a couple of hundred more rpm before the fuel supply stopped. I put dual springs in the mechanical pump and found about 700 more rpm.

Since a supercharged car needs a rich mixture at high blower pressure it is not desirable to have the carburetor lean out at this very critical time.

The device I am about to describe has worked very well to date:

If you can understand why valves float at certain (generally quite high) rpm you can understand why the device is necessary and why it works. It eliminates "fuel line float". At 5000 rpm the mechanical pump tries to pump 2500 cycles per minute. It is pulling a vacuum on the fuel line only 1/84th of a second per cycle. The next 1/84th of a second the gas flow is shut off because the pump is now on the pressure half of the cycle. In order for the fuel pump to fill during its suction stroke at 5000 rpm it must accelerate a column of gasoline about 12 feet long one to ten inches. (The distance depends on the fuel pump size, demand of engine and diameter of pipe.) If the fuel pump is 100% efficient and capable of 15 psi or better, the force, without electric help, pushing on this 3/8 inch column of fuel is only 1.62 pounds. (At standard temperature and pressure at sea level) this force is reduced 13% or to 1.40 pounds if the car is accelerating at 16 feet per second.


If the gas tank were placed one inch away from the fuel pump we would have to accelerate a much shorter column of gasoline in the alloted time of 1/84th second. Since this is not practical I made a simple gadget that makes the fuel pump "think" the tank is there. It is a small reservoir approximately 2" in diameter and 8" high with three

fittings. It has an air chamber area above the fuel, the fuel pump takes fuel from the bottom. The air acts like a spring and allows fuel to flow from this tank without having an equal amount come in from the 12 foot long fuel line. In operation fuel flows into the chamber in a relatively steady stream, the chamber feeds the fuel pump with its characteristic pulsing flow and will now operate at very high rpm. TC TANK FUEL PUMP

Since I am using a 20 foot coil of 1/2 inch tubing in a large cool can, I have found it necessary to add a second chamber at the discharge end of the fuel pump. The chamber must be air-tight and be large enough so air doesn't get sucked out with the gas due to splashing around. When the air space is filled with gasoline you are right back to where you started.

I have seen the phenomenon of "fuel line float" happen to stock supercharged engines and stock high rpm normally aspirated engines. Electric fuel pumps will solve the problem in non-supercharged engines if you can avoid going through a stock fuel pump. Also a 1/2" fuel line from the tank is a great help - NOT because it will flow more fuel but because the fuel doesn't have to move as far to fill the fuel pump each cycle.



J.C. WHITNEY RE-INTRODUCES STUDEBAKER 6-VOLT GENERATORS

A welcome product not seen in some time for our Studebaker 6-volt car people (1904-1955) is the electric generator. This device provides all the electrical power needed by the car once it starts.

The electric generator is a reliable component, but with most items with moving parts, there is a road risk when using them now with most of 30 years of service on them. Brushes, bushings, and armatures each have a limited lifetime and need renewal from time to time.

Current J.C. Whitney Catalog No. 4568, lists a replacement generator for Studebakers 1952-1955, on page 138, for \$59.95, no trade-in is required. You may send to them for their current catalog, for \$2.00. Their address is: P.O. Box 8410, Chicago, IL 60680.

Studebaker Corporation used two vendors for their generators; Delco Remy, and Autolite (Prestolite). Although the judges demand never to interchange vendor models, there is no electrical problem when doing so. Some drivers are using Delco generators with Autolite distributors or starters with no ill effects. BORROWED FROM



Filling Master Brake Cylinder Whith Aid of Curtain Rod

Avanti and Bankers Reach Agreement

Avanti Motor Corp. and 1st Source Bank, both of South Bend, Ind., recently entered into an agreement to resolve differences that prompted 1st Source Bank to seize all Avanti assets on Jan. 24.

The bank obtained the order to seize Avanti assets from St. Joseph County Circuit Court. The action came as the result of Avanti's default on a nearly \$3 million debt.

Avanti Motor Co. owner, Stephen Blake, said that the problems were triggered by an expensive problem with defective paint and the cost of introducing a new luxury Avanti convertible.

Blake said sales of the new Avanti have been "fabuleus," and noted that the cash probl has nothing to do with sales vel-

Blake said, "I'm really up about the future. We've got a long way to go, but we're going to get there.

Blake and 1st Source Bank said an agreement on restructuring its debt will let Avanti continue production despite the default.

The bank seized control due to a breakdown of negotiations over how to restructure the debt, Blake and bank officials said on Jan 25. The reason for the

breakdown was "so ridiculous it's not even worth discussing." Blake said.

Earlier, the supplier of paint to Avanti had filed suit against the car maker, claiming it hasn't been paid for more than \$18,000 rth of paint and other materials. Avanti, in turn, filed suit for





Look. One Hand! In a spot where there's barely space for one hand, how can you tape a wire? Simple enough, says Harry Morse, Oakland, Calif. Tear off a piece, re-roll with the sticky side out, and wind on with the fingers of one hand.

> DISTRIBUTOR STAND. Clamping a precision distributor into a vise is a careless procedure. An empty ignition wire spool can serve as a distributor service stand and it won't damage machined surfaces. Ask your local parts store if you can have a spool when they're through with it. Fabric stores are



another source for good spools.

A hole can also be cut in wooden workbenches to accommodate distributors. Cut the hole with a brace and bit or a key hole saw. An old distributor holddown clamp could also be bolted to the bench to hold the unit tightly in place.

FUSE FINDER. It's nice to know which fuse controls which outlet in th shop and an easy way to determine this is to plug in a vacuum cleaner and throw the fuse switches one at a time until you hear the vacuum stop. Then mark the fuse box to correspond with the outlet.


HOW TO EXTEND YOUR GENERATOR/ALTERNATOR LIFE

If you have recently paid \$200.00 to have your Studebaker generator (or your alternator) replaced, you should hope to not see that bill come around anytime soon. One way to assure that, is to remember that there are things you can do to extend generator life.

The first and main thing is to keep the oiler holes wet. The oilers are small pipes to lubricate the armature shaft bushings. The manuals say to squirt them with 30-wt. motor oil about every three months. What I do is poke the engine dipstick point into them whenever I look at the engine oil. Thus, I check the oil and at the same time oil the generator bushings.


The next thing is to keep the fan belt loose. That's right, you only want the generator to work, that is, to charge the battery gage. So you tighten the generator fan belt only tight enough to operate, but not too tight so as to burn out the shaft bushings. This is very true of alternators. Mike Elling's '63 Wagonaire, still has the original alternator at 326,000 miles. Because his fan belt's always loose, he says. He admits he only tightens it back up when the thing stops charging.

Another thing is to watch for brush wearout. You can replace the brushes yourself with only a screw driver on a generator. While you are at it, oil the brush tension springs. This is important on a seldom driven or stored car. Brush tension springs can become rusted in place and then as the brushes wear, the generator stops working. This could lead to a premature replacement; the brushes are just stuck. Keep an eye on your generator, you'll save some money!

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

Studebaker To Resume Production

SOUTH BEND. IN — It has been learned that the American Motors Corporation (AMC) has finalized an agreement with the Worthington Corporation, headquartered in New York, to purchase the Studebaker trademark as well as the old production facility located here in Southbend. A top official, who wished not to be named, said negotiations had been underway for some time with Worthington Corporation as well as the United Auto Workers, and an official announcement was imminent.

According to our source, the dilapidated manufacturing facility would be totally restored to a state-of-the-art facility. About the only thing that will remain the same from the production days of the 60's will be the address. It will include the latest in automated production; robots as well as air conditioning for the 1200 workers it is expected to employee once full production is reached in 1988 or 1989.

It is anticipated the first model year will be 1990. While not elaborating, our source says AMC will revive the size and body style of the 1960's Lark and combine it with the technology and fuel efficient engines of the late 1980's. "This will yield a car that Americans will stand in line for. A car with room for 6 adults, and the ability to pass gas stations and most other cars on the road."

To compete with the current mini-van rage, the Studebaker Division of AMC, as it is expected to be known, will again pull one out of the past. The slide-top Wagonnaire will be revived and modified in a manner similar to the Lark. The slide-top roof will be highlighted, giving the Wagonnaire the third dimension of the truck benefits as well as the traditional benefits of a car and van. It is anticipaated a third seat will be added to allow for additional passengers.

Relying again on an old familiar name, the Grand Turisimo Hawk will fill the slot of the flashy or sporty car. It is felt that the name is all that will come from former Studebaker days with most of the design of the 1990 Hawk coming from a remake of an AMC style. According to our source, "plans are sketchiest on this model, but will proceeed full speed ahead once it's all official." He further speculated that talks are under way with the Avanti Motor Corporation in hopes that Avanti and Studebaker could again be united. "This is our ultimate goal for the ultimate sports car. A car that would have to look over its shoulder to see a distant Corvette floundering behind it," states our source.

We were told that the Bendix Corporation is more than anxious to consumate a deal with AMC for the 840 acre proving ground located 15 miles from South Bend. We are told that even the half-mile infamous Studebaker tree sign will receive the much-needed attention it has lacked for nearly the past three decades. AMC would also use the proving ground for its testing track and renovations would also be undertaken there.

As far as manpower, our source stated, "It would be inpossible to rehire former Studebaker employees on a seniority basis. Too many have moved, retired from the working force or passed away. We are working with the UAW on a plan that would give persons with Studebaker experience a priority rating. We have the full cooperation of the UAW and expect no labor problems."

To answer the big question of WHY: why now? Why Studebaker? Why South Bend? The answer was why not? "Studebaker left us a great legacy. Great ideas but poor management. It was once said of Studebaker policy makers. when they came to a fork in the road they always picked the wrong road. We feel with the expertise of our top-level executives we will be able to make South Bend work again. Why now? Well now is the first time in th e 21-plus years since December, 1963 that we've been in the financial position to take on such a venture," our source stated. "Our financial position at the close of the Studebebaker Days in the late '60s was not as stable as that of Ford and GM. We found ourselves counting on our biggest division, automobiles, in stead of branching off into many different areas as Ford and GM did. Then we were faced with the near-disasterous oil embargo of 1973, the flood of the market in the late 70s with imports," says our source. The new Studebaker Automobile Division feels that they will be right in front of the competition with a roomy automobile that will get around 43 miles to the gallon.

"It has taken prudent management and sound business deals to bring us to the position we are now in, the position of being able to undertake this exciting venture. In this industry we often hear, 'they don't build them like they used to'. We're going to answer that challenge and better it." says our source.

While no specific date for finalization of an agreement could be made at this time, we were assured by month's end all would be a matter of public record: No figure was given regarding the purchase of the Studebaker name and facility or the estimated cost of the renovation venture. We were told corporate assets as well as government guarantees, similar to those given Chrysler would be involved. Our source told us that the government was most agreeable in offering the loans to the new Studebaker Corporation. They felt that the more competition between American made cars would further drive the price down and give the imports a run for the money.

LITTLE KNOWN WHEELCOVER FOR 1953

An all but forgotten Studebaker factory dealer announcement, issued February 21, 1956, authorizes wheelcover AC-2799 for all Studebaker automobiles back through the 1953 model year. The cover, popular with drivers of the 1957-1961 model years, is referred to as the "chrome and gold spoke-type wheelcover," and displays the Studebaker heraldic crest on a gold field circled on a enter cone. From the center cone, spokes in relief radiate to the edge. This relief is emphasized with a black painted field.

The surprising mid-year introduction of these covers pose a mystery. One theory is that they were introduced after the vendor of the 1953-1956 wire wheelcovers (AC-2425) went out of business. The dealer announcement itself gives little solution; it is coded by the factory as "S84 (2-21-56)". Rediscovery of the announcement occurred during the swap portion of the Tri-State Studebaker Meet in Ashville, NC, October 25-27, 1974. The announcement, itself having value as one of the only copies known, is printed duo-tone process red and blue on glossy white stock. It features a 1956 Golden Hawk at the top of a two-page 8-1/2 X 11-inch folder. It is designed to insert into the 5-ring notebook of the 1956 Parts and Accessories Guide. Dealer net price for the covers is given as \$15.90 per set of four.

Most AC-2799 wheelcovers are seen on 1957 Presidents and Hawks. Various accessory catalogs give their availability through the 1961 model year for all Studebakers with 15-inch wheels. Now with the knowledge of this dealer announcement, drivers may use these wheel covers on their earlier showcars with the justification that they were available, authorized, replacement covers. Up to now, pre-1957 showcars were subject to penalty when judges considered AC-2799 as an unauthorized accessory.



HISTORICAL OUTLINE OF STUDEBAKER AUTOMOBILES

Robert N. Kennedy

1852

On the morning of February 16th in 1852, Henry and Clem Studebaker opened their blacksmith shop, H & C Studebaker, in South Bend, Indiana. Their total capital was the sum of \$68. Business went well, and by 1857 they had produced their first of many government contracts - - 100 U.S. Army supply vagons.

1859

John M. Studebaker, Jr., returned from California with \$8,000 in gold which he had earned making wheelbarrows for the gold miners. "Wheelbarrow Johnny's" capital was invested in the thriving company, whose name was changed to tudebaker Brothers Manufacturing Company.

1895

By this time Studebaker was the world's largest manufacturer of horsedrawn vehicles. Both North and South had been customers during the Civil War. A quick rebuilding after the disasterous fire of 1874 helped Studebaker to attain this position of strength.

1902

Studebaker's first horseless carriage was an electric in this year. Studebaker was the only manufacturer in the world to make a successful transition from horsedrawn vehicles to the "new fangled" conveyances. The first Studebaker gasoline powered motor car appeared in 1904 as the Studebaker-Garford.

1911

Studebaker Corporation was incorporated. Electric car production halted in 1912. By 1916, car production was concentrated in South Bend, where horsedrawn vehicle production lasted until 1920. 1928

This year saw Studebaker purchase a large interest in the Pierce-Arrow Motor Car Company. The smaller sized Erskine was produced in the late 1920's, as was its successor, the Rockne, in the early 1930's alongside the company's larger Commander, President, and Dictator models.

<u>1935</u>

Studebaker was successfully brought out of receivership by Harold Vance (later president of the corporation), Paul Hoffman, and Ashton Bean. Overdrive gear boxes were introduced.

<u>1939</u>

The Lark's grandfather, the economical Champion, made a great hit on the U.S. market. Through the war, Studebaker contributed to the defense effort with bomber engines, amphibious weasel vehicles, and military trucks.

1947

A most memorable year for Studebaker. The company's Champion and Commander models startled the world with new, revolutionary modern post-war styling. These cars were so advanced that the design was virtually unchanged through 1952. Automatic drive was introduced in 1950, and a modern OHV V-8 engine was offered in 1951.

<u> 1953</u>

Beginning its second hundred years, Studebaker celebrated with another stunning design—the Loewy coupe and hardtop. This body was used through 1964 in the Hawk line. Studebaker's first modern station wagon, appropriately named Conestoga, appeared in 1954. This year also saw the merger of Studebaker and Packard on October 1st. The President line, dropped in 1942, was revived in 1955.

<u>1956</u>

Introduction of the Hawk line with its star, the Golden Hawk, was the highlight of 1956. Twin-traction also appeared at this time, for an industry first.

1959

The "New Dimension in Motoring", the Lark, was introduced as the only full line of compacts in the country. The Lark was an immediate success. Though the other large models had been discontinued, the Silver Hawk remained as a prestige car.

1962

Gran Turismo Hawk! The Hawk was beautifully redesigned and hailed as a modern classic. In mid-year, for the third time in 16 years, Studebaker awed the motoring world with a new design—the AVANTI! Constructed of molded fiber-glass with an integral rool bar, plus the Super R series of power plants the AVANTI was a milestone in automotive history. Slide-top wagonaires also appeared.

1963

In late 1963 Studebaker concentrated all vehicle manufacturing at its modern and efficient plant in Hamilton, Ontario. As no plans were made to produce the AVANTI in Canada, Newman and Altman, Inc. of South Bend bought the rights to manufacture the car in 1964, and commenced production of the handbuilt AVANTI II in mid-1965.

1966

On March 4th Studebaker sadly ceased all motor vehicle production. The company name lives on in the non-automotive divisions (some of which are Gravely Tractors, STP, Clarke Floor Equipment, and Franklin Appliances) under the heading of Studebaker-Worthington. It also lives on in the hearts of many people the world over who still proudly own, operate and love Studebaker cars and trucks.




1987 will be held at Estes Park, Colorado. This meet is a long way off but the host Club has started the long preparation.

At our August Board of Directors meeting, President Larry Good announced that he was transferring to St. Petersburg. By the time you read this, he will already have assumed his duties at his new location.

This marks the second time this year that our Chapter has lost two board members at one time. This leaves a tremendous void when events preclude two Board members from serving out their terms.

The departure of Larry and JoAnn leaves the offices of President and Secretary staffed by members too remote to attend our meetings, thereby preventing them from playing the active rolls required by these positions.

This Chapter was brought to life by 8 members who worked very hard and made many sacrifices to keep it alive. With 62 family memberships, we now have approximately 110 adults in our Chapter (some don't act like adults, but I am counting them anyway).

This means that we have added 102 members since the Chapter was formed. Of these 102 additional members, only 4 have become totally involved to the point that they take part in EVERY Chapter event. To be included in this group, you would have to attend at least 10 monthly meetings a year, miss no more than 1 Chapter sponsored activity, AND be part of the team that did the work to put on the events.

For various reasons, 4 of the original 8 founders are no longer active enough to fit in the above category. By doing some simple math, it is obvious that even though we have added 102 members, we still only have 8 members running the Chapter. The departs of Larry and JoAnn will reduce that number to 6. Six members out of 110 plan, decide, coordinate and carry out the functions of this apter.

In a less active category, there are about 10 - 15 members who do lend a (welcome) hand and get involved with meetings and events at least 50 percent of the time. Taking the high figure, we have approximately 20 members (less than 20%) doing everything.

So much for the hard part. My purpose is not to complain, but to show the impact on our Chapter when we lose a hard working member. Even though they will remain members, Larry and JoAnn will be missed.

Besides losing them, we will also lose our regular monthly meeting place as the 7-Eleven district office where we held our meetings, was Larry's regular place of business.

We will have to raise the prices for future Chapter name badges because we will now have to pay to have the individual names put on. Larry was able to have the names cut into the badges at no cost to the Chapter.

I will no longer be able to use the now famous "Right hand of Good" title each month, for these messages to you (curses).

I will miss both of them not only for their contributions to our Chapter, but for the friendship that has sprung up from their getting involved.

Good luck to the Good family, I hope your move is all that you want it to be. My personal thanks for all the help you have given me, and thanks for the "fin transportation/delivery service". The rubber ducky is dead.







As many of you are aware, each Chapter can send its Newsletter to the SDC publications committee for judging competition. The Orlando Area Chapter has been submitting Greasy Prints to the committee since early 1984

The committee consists of Rich Holcomb, Jan Lockmon, Ron Meyer, Gloria Anderson, Lloyd Martin, and Don Dobbins. These members rate each Newsletter for cover appeal, general layout, editing, essential data, calendar, chapter activities, chapter people, technical tips, original features, classified ads, and motivation.

The results of their efforts are distributed each year at the International SDC meet during the Editors meeting.

This year Greasy Prints finished 6th out of 23 entries with an overall average of 82.11. This was just over 6 points shy of the winning publication, Northstar Wheel, which had an average of 88.78. The final tally was very close with only 7.36 points separating the top seven entries.

I am sure that this is a time consuming effort on the part of the committee, and I think it is extremely good of them to take the time to perform this task. I've always felt that a good Chapter newsletter is a must, in order for any chapter to be successful.

I thought it might be interesting to turn the tables, and rate the members of the SDC Publications committee. Let me point out that the opinions expressed here are mine and not those of our Editor. All my remarks are intended to be constructive, so don't all of you committee members gang up on me next year.

First off, I would like to say that we took great pains to insure that each member of the committee was sent a copy of every issue. Unless there was some problem with the mail, each committee member should have had twelve issues to rate.

Here are my ratings: (10 = a perfect score)

---- Category #1 - NUMBER OF MEMBERS REPORTING. One member's scores were not included for some reason. Rating for this category = 9.

---- Category #2 - NUMBER OF ISSUES JUDGED BY EACH MEMBER. Two members judged 11 issues, one judged 12, one judged 10, and one members individual rating sheet was not included. Rating = 10 (assume postal service problems).

---- Category #3 - MATHEMATICS. All the judges scores passed the Ambrogio mathematical verification test. Rating = 10.

---- Category #4 - MEMBERS COMMENTS. This area could stand some improvement. When a medium to low score is given, a reason should always be given to help the Editor correct the condition. One member wrote all

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kinds of comments after rating a 10 for the category, but made no comment when a rating of 5, 3, or 2 was given. My rating = 4. (ouch)

---- Category #5 - NEATNESS. All of the rating sheets were easy to read, even though 2 were hand written. The summary sheet should have listed the contestants in order by score starting with the best one first. All in all, a good job. Rating = 10.

---- Category #6 - RATING CONSISTENCY. There was much inconsistency among the raters in several categories. In the Motivation category, one member gave a rating of 10 for each issue, one member gave all 8 and 9 ratings, one gave all 2 ratings, and one gave ratings ranging ranging from 0 to 4. There is definitely too much disparity here and this makes the job impossible for an Editor. Rating = 2.

As I said earlier, I think the job these people perform is a very important one. This is an excellent way to get help on improving any chapter newsletter, and although I am certain this group enjoys reading these newsletters each month, it must still be quite a task to sit down and rate each one objectively.

A chapter newsletter is often the only contact some members have with their chapter. They join simply to belong, and to read about some of the local goings on.

Although all of the chapter officers perform a vital task, it is the editor whose work comes under the scrutiny of every member each and every issue. If the President makes a mistake, only a handful of members may find out about it. The work of the editor, however, is in plain view and there is no place for him to hide when he makes an error.

The Publications committee therefore can be of great help to the editor by indicating those areas which could stand some improvement as well as by pointing out where a good job is being done.

I hope I haven't made any enemies among the members of the publications committee. I do hope, however, that I have let them know that there are some of us among the 10,000+ SDC members who do care and are interested in their opinions on our newsletters.

I have had some fun "Turning the Tables" on this group, but I do feel that providing comments on the rating sheet, and being consistant with the ratings are two important aspects of this function.

I have only seen the rating sheets for our Newsletter, Greasy Prints, so I could not really do a thorough and accurate "Rating the Raters". I do hope that I have given this group something to think about.

No matter how good a job we may be doing, there is no reason why we can't try to do even better.



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


UPDATING A STUDE

I have just read the road test in MOTOR LIFE (Sept. '60) of the Studebaker Hawk. I noticed that the steering was 4.5 turns lock-to-lock. I own a 1955 Commander coupe that has six turns lock-to-lock. Can I swap the Pitman arm for one from a 1960 Hawk to reduce the steering ratio? Also, can the Studebaker finned brake drums be fitted to my car? David Pastor

Baltimore, Md.

The '60 Hawk Pitman arm is interchangeable with yours. Of course the steering linkage will have to be readjusted.

Late Studebaker finned brake drums can be put on your car, but because of a change in bearings, you will have to get '56 or '57 spindle assemblies, which are interchangeable with the '55 Commander. The rear drums fit without other changes, and your existing backing plates and shoe assemblies are OK. With good heavy-duty linings, you will see real improvement in both stopping power and fade resistance.
