?3rd INTERNATIONAL S.D.C. MEET

ESTES PARK, COLORADO

Remember the year Studebaker used the slogan "Different By Design"? This year our hosts, the Conestoga Chapter, used the same slogan to indicate that this meet would have some different activities. And it was different, with many events that we will long remember and hopefully repeat at future meets.

It even started differently before we actually got there. We arrived in Colorado a day early so we could drive around in the mountains to see the sights. We drove to the top of Mount Evans (at over 14,000 feet the highest automobile road in North America) where there was still ice and snow in mid July. Then we approached Estes Park from the west, over Trail Ridge Road (at 12,183 feet the highest continuous automobile road in North America). Monday was the Board of Directors Meetingor rather, the first session of the Board of Directors Meetings. 


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
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
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
