These registration packets were individually filled with tickets for tours and specific activity information that guests needed for the week. Sunday, June 25

Guests arriving at the airport were surprised to have a 1940 Commander, owned by a local limousine company, pick them up at the airport, courtesy of the North Star Chapter. The Wagon Train, which left Scobie Montana in April, arrived at the Mall of America, stopover site of the Interstate Batteries Great American Race. Back at the hotel, the general membership meeting was attended by another 200 people. They heard about decisions made at the national board meeting, including the 1997 Meet being awarded to the Michiana Chapter, to be held in South Bend.

Wednesday, June 29

When the North Star Chapter Meet committee met for its daily 7 a.m. breakfast meeting on Wednesday, everyone was able to report smooth sailing and positive comments at the halfway point of the meet.

Tour highlights today included 110 people visiting the Ford Plant in St. Paul, (which sold out months prior to the event) and a very funny comedy at the Old Log Theater was enjoyed by 125 people.

Hundreds attended the most successful auction in SDC history. About \$4000 was raised from the merchandise that was donated for the benefit of the Studebaker Drivers Club!

Inside, Chief Judge Dave Ridge was hosting the judges breakfast and reviewing guidelines. At 9 a.m., the judging of 198 vehicles began. There were also 132 cars and trucks in the display category, for a total of 320 in the concourse parking areas.

This year participants parked in their specific classes throughout the week. Thanks to Jim Rock and his crew, the concept worked admirably and added to viewer enjoyment.

Fun Night capped off the day with music and dancing.

Friday, July 1

Bruce Slifer and his family got up early to set up his huge toy collection for display. Also that morning the watch and model judging was held, along with the literature swap and sale. North Star members jumped in to prepare for the final event – the annual Banquet and Awards Ceremony.

Over 500 people attended the banquet and were treated to an excellent array of food, topped off by a dazzling entrance of waiters carrying flaming baked Alaska for dessert. The North Star Chapter, the Badger Wheel Chapter (from nearby Wisconsin) and other volunteers were given a huge ovation.


