Over two years in the making, the 42nd Annual Studebaker Drivers Club International Meet is now behind us. It was a major event for our relatively small chapter. We set out to do a good job and have fun. We feel we succeeded at both.

From the earliest promotional items (shirts, pins and calendars) to the final payments for the tours and events, keeping track of our accounting was a must.

Luckily, SDC and the International Meet Committee handled the hotel arrangements. That had to be brutal! Most of the organizing on our part, however, was fun. Deciding and coordinating the tours, designing the



shirts and pins, taking pictures for the calendars were all fun projects.

Even for the regulars in our chapter who have enjoyed attending International meets for a number of years, either as a participant or maybe as a vendor, the 42nd Annual in Omaha was experienced from a new angle: that of host.

At each meet you get to see old friends and make a few new ones. As host, you don't have as much time to visit with people you have gotten to know over the years or much time to make new friends. Making sure things got done like rooms being available, vendors situated, guests registered, vehicles parked, tours leaving on time, sales of shirts, pins and ice cream, and overall just making sure our guests felt welcome, was a full-time task. Our mission statement was that no job was too large or too small,

no question too silly to ensure the enjoyment of all our guests.

Despite the flurry of activity, having our Studebaker friends come to Omaha was an experience none of us would have wanted to miss.

Briefly, a few final numbers: 649 registrations accounting for 1,246 people from 7 countries and 3 continents and

352 vehicles of which 213 were judged. Quite impressive.

Although it was nice to have all the activities so close together around the hotel, the hotel itself was a bit difficult to navigate. The building consists of a series of constructions that had occurred over the years. The hallways are long and, if you weren't paying atten-

tion, you could walk around in circles for a while before finding a particular event or room. The most frequently asked question of the whole week of the meet was "Where is the Omaha Room?"

The Studebaker Band was fantastic. The Wednesday night concert and the concours performance on Thursday were both superb. The concert was well received, not only because of their magnificent rendition of
