59th Annual SDC International Meet Recap

Por years, our late and past Wisconsin Region SDC president, Rick Rechek, talked about his dream of bringing the international meet in Manitowoc, Wisconsin. In fact, he started doing some legwork in the summer of 2021, talking to the visitors' center and touring hotels in the area. Unfortunately, Rick passed away in January of 2022. That's when four of our members: Dick Pollen, Jim Pepper, Chris Krause and myself decided we wanted to put on the meet – especially since no other chapter stepped up to the plate. We put our ideas forth at our spring meeting in 2022. We applied to the SDC Board, got approval, and moved forward. Our Meet Committee spent less than a year coordinating and marketing this large event at the Manitowoc County Fairgrounds.

Our response from the local community and businesses was outstanding. We applied for and received a \$2,500 grant from Visit Manitowoc to help assist us with marketing expenses to draw people to the area from both inside and outside the Studebaker Drivers Club. We really emphasized making this a community event as well, and we were very successful.

Steve Kanter used his marketing communications experience to create all of the marketing materials (Meet

Guide, Calendar, Signage, Social Media) and took care of public relations with radio and TV. We provided marketing support on all signage, calendar, and meet guide by adding logos and

ads for Visit Manitowoc. Our committee of Dick Pollen, Jim Pepper, Chris Krause, and Steve Kanter created public events to generate public enthusiasm for our cars – and we advertised local businesses in our meet guide. Everything worked beyond expectations. Our efforts drew over 200 Studebakers, nearly 1,000 club members, and 500 members of the public over the 5-day event.

We received great media coverage on Fox 11 Green Bay (four segments), local Seehafer radio stations, and

WOGB in Green Bay. Plus, the Fox station in Milwaukee also picked up the Fox 11 broadcast.

The meet attendance was beyond all expectations with people coming from all

over the U.S. and four foreign countries. Our club felt that we did a great job highlighting our cars and the benefits of our beautiful Lakeshore area, both to our members and the public.

Our parade from Manitowoc to Two Rivers had over 120 cars and hundreds of the public lined Maritime and Memorial Drive to see our cars roll by. Our local businesses enjoyed increased revenues and we filled up most of the hotels in the area (the third most rooms this year, according to Visit Manitowoc. Local restaurants reported extremely busy days during the event. The fairgrounds provided a great venue for a swap meet, car display and judging, a sock hop and, at the end, a community car show featuring all makes of cars. Hundreds of locals flooded

the fairgrounds on Friday and Saturday. We even had a Studebaker first – wine and beer tasting – which went over extremely well.

Manitowoc 2023, a Technical Perspective

Hosting an SDC International Meet was a dream of Rick Recheck. When we decided to go forward with Rick's vision, I agreed to be part of the Meet committee and volunteered to take on being responsible for the on-site seminars. I have always felt that our International Meets should be working conventions. By that I mean, besides catching up with old friends, making new friends, scouring the swap meet, and looking at all the cars, you should be able to learn something useful. Judging by the feedback and the seminar attendance, I believe we were successful. A few seminars ran a little over on time but it was not a problem. (I would have benefitted by a big clock on the back wall).

My wife, Cindy, suggested we try to have some seminars that were not about Studebakers. One of the seminars was devoted to gardening, presented by Master Gardener Sandy Schwartz. Sandy did a phenomenal presentation that was well received by quite a few members.

With the Meet being in Manitowoc it was decided to conduct a sale benefitting the Museum during the meet. Terry and Marcia Frye manned the tables with help from Pete and Gary Wendt. I want to thank our members who donated items and who purchased items. We raised an additional \$1204 for the Museum in 2023. Thank you to all who helped out.
