
Dubuque Iowa 2024 SDC International Meet



There were over a thousand of you, and we appreciate the time, work, and travel it took to come to Iowa! We hoped to show you a good time, and I think we accomplished that! It was fun to see old friends again. I made some new friends and finally met some of you with whom I worked on other projects.

A walk around the grounds showed off two buildings filled with vendors, plus several outside. Over 200 Studebaker and related vehicles were in attendance. Jane Stinson reports that eighty vehicles were judged,







the day the rain poured. They traveled from Indiana, Illinois, Alabama, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Florida, Iowa, and Minnesota to help us.

We also had some nonautomotive but equally interesting presentations about skincare for all ages, the beekeeping hobby, and raising monarch butterflies.





candy from his mom's candy bowl for the rest of the swap meet, but he insisted I already ate enough candy, and he would only give me two more pieces.


On Friday and Saturday, I traded Luke some Turning Wheels, Avanti magazines and Avanti calendars if he promised to share them with his friends during

I gave a one hour technical seminar on Wednesday where I dealt with modernizing a Studebaker or any old car in general. We had great attendance for the seminar and great interest in the

subject. I also misjudged the time needed to cover my material. It was cut a little short at the end. I apologize for that.

Below is a rough outline of the material that was covered. I did not have enough copies to go around so now everyone has one. I think most attendees got something out of it. I didn't put very many people to sleep. It was a success. Thank you all who attended.

The Bob Palma Memorial Live Co-Operator on Thursday had a sparse panel this year. Only four of the nine Co-Operator advisors were at the Meet. It was Carl and Herman Thoms, Jon Meyer, Myself, and Mike Baker, who agreed to sit in.

Make Your Studebaker a Modern Car (or Truck)

We have gotten spoiled by modern conveniences and improvements in the auto industry over the years. As such, many people are reluctant to take an old car on a long road trip. Improving reliability, fuel economy, fuel compatibility, and creature comfort can be done. The following ideas will get you there.

Engine:

Engines of today are machined extremely accurate. As such there is very little cylinder to cylinder variance. Tuning no longer needs to accommodate a bad cylinder. Many people and some manufacturers were not very good at proper tuning. Today a processor can do it for you.

- Engine accuracy and tighter bearing clearance allows lighter oil for better economy.
- Thinner rings and modern honing techniques reduce parasitic friction resulting in more power and better economy.
- Modern fuel injection systems can be used. Everything from a bolt on throttle body to port injection is available. An electric pump in the tank could be included. Holley, Fitech, Edelbrock, MSD, and Fast are just a few of the system suppliers.
- Ignition can be a blueprinted point type distributor to coil on plug distributor-less electronically controlled timing and everything in between.
- Electric fans and 180° to 195° coolant temperature aids fuel economy.
- Cool intake air is necessary.

Transmission:

- An automatic overdrive with a lockup converter works well. It improves economy and reduces interior engine noise.
- Various manual overdrive transmissions can be used as well.

Rear axle:

• Generally, 3.31 to 3.73 is the best ratio. Rear end ratio should be compatible and matched to the rest of the power train plus the intended use of the vehicle.

Chassis and Suspension:

- Springs and shocks can be upgraded for a better ride.
- Sway bars front and rear can be added and/or improved.
- Original chassis are notoriously flexible. That flex gets transmitted into the body and makes handling somewhat unpredictable. A tubular "X" member can be fabricated to stiffen the original frame.
- Aftermarket front and rear suspensions are available requiring some fabrication skills.
- Complete replacement chassis can be purchased from various sources (Art Morrison, JW Rod Garage, Chris Alston Chassis Works, Schwartz Performance, and others).
- Electric power steering is possible.
- Brake upgrades are available.

Body:

- Sound deadener and floor insulation help passenger comfort and reduce fatigue.
- Claw type door latches tighten door closure.
- Later type window runs can replace cat whiskers so movable windows do not rattle.
- Contoured seats with side bolsters and lumbar support reduce fatigue.
- Power windows, locks, and seats are possible.
- A/C is easily added.
- A side impact beam can be added into doors for safety.
- Modern sound systems with satellite radio are available.
- New cars and trucks door weather strips are a thick channel seal that goes over a standing pinch weld.
 This can be fabricated and incorporated in your vehicle.

The finished product should be able to be driven cross country with minimal fatigue, 20+ MPG, using standard E-10 pump gas, and being able to listen to your tunes or talking in the interior.

As we age we reflect on what's been important to us over the years, and the Studebaker Drivers Club comes to mind.

I have no idea how, early on, I became such a lover of the "art" of the automobile. After grade school I became infatuated with customizing model cars, chopping tops, and sectioning bodies. I was a regular at one drugstore and spent considerable time perusing *Car Craft, Hot Rod* and other periodicals until the proprietor advised me he was not running a library. I was welcome to purchase magazines but not study them in his store. By age 14 I had a profitable lawn care and snow shoveling business and by 15 I had accumulated enough money for my first car. It got shaved and decked and a local shop painted it for me.

I bought and sold cars, learning through the school of hard knocks. Two additional cars later, at age 16, I purchased a 1950 Studebaker Champion. Hundreds of cars later I bought my second Stude, just after the Estes Park meet in 1987, a '63 Avanti, and I was hooked and I joined SDC.

We've been members of various vehicle-related clubs: AACA, Corvair Club, GTO Club, SKPs, FMCA, GMCMH Club, Jaguar Club, Toronado Club, Oldsmobile Club, but nothing comes even close to our Studebaker Club! The International's *Turning Wheels*, local clubs' newsletters and tours, the camaraderie, are beyond all expectations and many of the members have become "family".

In January the Southern Arizona Chapter of SDC held its banquet and annual business meeting at the White Stallion Ranch, north of Tucson. A member of the Studebaker "family", Peggy Eastburn, stood up and told the story of her young son falling out of their motorhome on I-10 north of Tucson 30 years ago, and how the Southern Arizona club members came to their rescue during the following trying weeks.

She pitched the Grand Canyon Chapter tour of John Polhill's fantastic collection of Studebakers, SOBs, and automobile memorabilia in Phoenix so we went to see it.

What a grand collection and pleasurable experience! How generous of John to open his place for our pleasure.

They became "family".

We've collected memories across these United States, many with Stude editors and other RV/car nuts. We attended one meet in Missouri where we were iced in and couldn't get out of our motorhome. Another club meet left many members in the armory due to a tornado. Once

Across the states we've met other Stude aficionados, visited them and toured their locales which included numerous autorelated museums and gatherings: Nethercutt, Peterson, Lemay, Forney, Pioneer, Iola, Hickory Corners, Greenfield Village, Rambler Ranch, Back to the '50s, plus private auto collections and various auto, RV, and other manufacturing plants. We've attended International Meets in Las Vegas, Estes Park, Phoenix, Colorado Springs, South Bend, Portland, Rapid City, Minneapolis, Springfield all the while soaking up the culture of the area we're visiting.

We continue to travel and regularly attend the SDC Labor Day Zone Meet in South Dakota. Last summer we traveled to Manitowoc, Wisconsin, for the International Meet and ended up inside a submarine.

We had snow and cold temperatures in Colorado and Wyoming, but that seldom stopped us from traveling to Denver for winter meetings. We don't understand the emphasis on winter storage, especially with hundreds of us in central and southern states. Keep drivin' your classics!! And especially - share and collect memories with your SDC "family".
